Safeguarding Our Drinking Water

In April 2009, delegates to the League of Women Voters of South Carolina's state convention adopted a two-year study of water issues in South Carolina. Safeguarding the quality of water is one of the issues. Others are water quantity and interstate conflicts affecting quantity and quality.

Richard Cyr, general



manager of the Hilton

Head PSD since 2003, outlined threats to the sources of potable water in the area. In the coastal region, most fresh water comes from underground sources, mainly the Upper and Middle Floridan aquifers. Communities and businesses from Edisto, SC, to Brunswick, GA, pump water from these aquifers through wells. Public utilities in our area also buy Savannah River water through the Beaufort-Jasper Water & Sewer Authority.

A major concern of area public utilities is the intrusion of salt water into the aquifers. Currently, the intrusion rate is one foot a day—a mile every 15 years. Nothing can be done to stop the intrusion,

which results from more fresh water being taken out than put back in. Even if all wells taking water from the aquifers between Edisto and Brunswick were turned off, it would take at least 300 years for the water in the aquifers to become salt free.

To ensure that the water it supplies is safe to drink, HHPSD continually tests for 100 dangerous contaminants as required by federal (Environmental Protection Agency) and state (Department of Health and Environmental Control) regulations. At least 15 tests check on secondary concerns such as taste and odor issues. Some 500 samples are continuously taken at six

Happy Thanksgiving

Our League was one of seven local Leagues from South Carolina who were chosen this year to participate in a national LWV initiative to enhance recruitment of new members and to retain more current members. Other SC Leagues participating are Charleston, Clemson, Columbia, Darlington, Georgetown and Greenville. Local League members Fran Holt and Kathy Quirk attended the kick-off training this summer in Columbia. They were impressed, as always, with the energy and "smarts" of League women. The two day training focused on the importance of (1) being intentional: using all our activities and events as possible recruiting tools and (2) being welcoming:

communicating our interest in visitors and sharing our enthusiasm for League as a place where we look at important issues and we get things done. A major emphasis of the national initiative agenda is to increase our visibility in the community.

Our League has certainly had a successful beginning this fall with all the publicity surrounding the mayoral forums and election issues. Our League leaders served as moderators and our name was very much in the news. Beaufort County Board of Elections and Registration Meetings

The Board of Canvassers' convened November 5th and November 18th, 3 and 2 days after elections.

On November 5th, 132 Provisional and failsafe Ballot envelopes were examined by the board.

46 Ballots were accepted by the board after supporting facts were established by election staff. This included the ballots of 2 voters that were present at the board meeting to give background facts concerning their provisional ballots.

34 Ballots were rejected by State Election Law due to missing witness signatures on absentee ballot envelopes.

52 Ballots were rejected by board vote; provisionally voted in wrong precinct, not registered, late registration, insufficient

information noted on envelope or incorrect ballot type given to voter by poll workers (such as provisional when a failsafe was warranted)

On November 18th, 7 provisional/failsafe ballots were presented to the board.

6 were accepted
1 rejected due to lack of registration found in records

Each provisional/failsafe ballot voter will receive a letter from the Board of Election explaining the board action with a change of address or new registration form as necessary.

Provisional ballots are cast when a person's voter eligibility is in question. Failsafe ballots are issued when a voters right to vote is not in question, such as

a change of address.

Each group of accepted ballots were then opened anonymously by staff with a board member witnessing. The votes were added to the election total. Final numbers were presented to the board for certification. The election was complete.

The next meeting of the Board of Elections will be held December 8, 2010 @ 10 AM at 15 John Galt Road, Beaufort. The meeting will be televised. Agenda will include a critique and action plan for procedures and incidents of these past two elections.

key spots to test for contaminants. The local test reports are sent to DHEC. As required by the EPA, customers also receive these reports. In addition, water quality audits are conducted by out-of-town officials. The HHPSD has not had a drinking water violation in four years. All other utilities have to meet the same standards.

To reduce demand on the fresh water supply, utilities are promoting more efficient use of water. New products, such as low-flow shower heads and low-use toilets, have become more common. Use of recycled and re-

claimed water is more widespread. Most golf courses in the area use reclaimed water. The largest amount of potable water goes to irrigating plants and lawns.

South Carolina and Georgia are attempting to come to an agreement about withdrawal of water from the aquifers and the Savannah River. Savannah and a large paper plant near the city are heavy users of fresh water.

To add to the quantity of available potable water HHPSD has built a reverse osmosis plant to process brackish water. The South Island Utility also uses reverse osmosis. Desalinization plants

are much more expensive to build and operate.

Another effort to increase the amount of fresh water available at peak times is through a technique called Aquifer Storage and Recovery. During off-peak usage periods (the winter), surplus treated water is stored in the Middle Floridan Aquifer. Then during the summer period of peak usage, the treated water is pumped out. This technique is being used throughout the coastal areas of the United States.

Meeting with Senator Tom Davis



Co-Presidents Barbara Swift and Ginny Ghirardelli and I had the pleasure of meeting informally with Senator Tom Davis on November 19. After congratulating Senator Davis on his appointment to Governor-Elect Haley's fiscal crisis task force, we discussed several issues of interest to our League.

Senator Davis was quite optimistic about being able to get legislation passed that would change the current funding formula and give an equitable share of state funding for education to Beaufort County. He is working closely with other areas such as Charleston that share out problem. If necessary, they will withhold support for legislation wanted by other areas to get support for their legislation. One of the main changes to the formula would be to establish a minimum amount of money each school district would receive. Another is to give weight to the number of children for whom English is a second language.

He is also optimistic about keeping the Heritage on Hilton Head Island. He doesn't think any corporations are currently ready to

sponsor it, but he thinks the legislature will do what is needed to save this important event.

The League's judicial study very much interested Senator Davis. If his schedule permits, he'll participate in our February program on this issue. He feels strongly that the current method of selecting judges needs to be changed and that more diversity would result from that change. He does not favor quotas.

The Senator believes Jasper Port could become a reality in four or five years. This would require a regional effort to get the required highways built. It would also require a decision to make the targeted market be goods not shipped by container in contrast to the Savannah and Charleston ports. This market is of real interest to a few large corporations.

When asked about the Tax Realignment Commission (TRAC), which is expected to report on its recommendations soon, Senator Davis said that the recommendations could not be implemented in time to help with this year's budget. He questions having a commission that does not include

members elected by the people. There are no legislators on TRAC. In regard to specific tax issues, the Senator indicated that he would continue to push for eliminating the amazingly large number of exemptions from the state sales tax.

Our final topic was voter photo identification legislation. He supports last year's Senate bill that included a two-year transition period and an early voting provision. He believes the legislation is needed, because fraud may be a greater problem in the future. Even if the League does not agree with him on this issue because of the costs and the likelihood that it would discourage people from voting, we all agreed that there are many issues on which we can work well together. We look forward to hearing more from Senator Davis at the public meetings he plans to hold locally during the legislative session, which starts on January 11 and ends in June, and we hope to see him on February 23, when we participate in Legislative Day in Columbia.
